Three Easy Steps to Receive Your CME Credit

Did you know? If you are a full-time family doctor with an average-sized practice, up to 23 of your patients could be transgender. If someone came to you asking for help to transition from one sex to another, how would you help them? In this workshop you will learn information and skills to confidently answer that question, which is not as complicated as many physicians think it would be.

The presentation will address terminology, making your office transgender-friendly, resources/guidelines, hormones and follow-up care, preventive services, referral/resources for counseling/support and surgery and coding/billing. Presenters are family physicians who provide primary care—including hormone therapy—to transgender patients in their practices in Athens, Ohio.

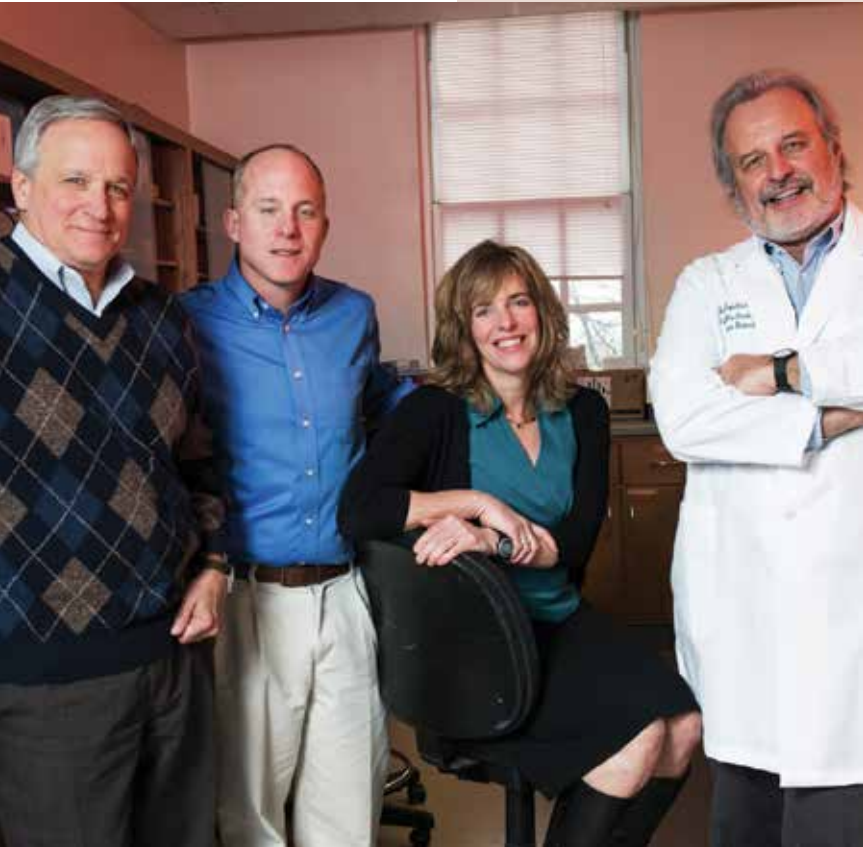

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A FOCUS ON VETERANS HEALTH

More than two million U.S. service men and women have been deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan since September 11, 2001, according to a report issued by the White House last year.

On Friday morning the CME is dedicated to veterans medicine. The sessions were developed through collaboration between OU-HCOM, CHEAO/Area Health Education Center and the OOA as part of the National AHEC Organization's nationwide effort to mobilize their networks to educate civilian health professionals about deployment-related health issues.

The nationwide effort is in direct support of the White House Joining Forces Initiative, a project chaired by First Lady Michelle Obama and Dr. Jill Biden to call attention to the education, employment and wellness of U.S. veterans and their families.

The sessions will open with breakfast and color guard presentation in honor of veterans, and will be followed by five educational segments, seminars and presentations dealing with health issues critical to veterans and their families.

Colonel Matthew Moorman, M.D., State Air Surgeon, Ohio National Guard and surgeon at Cleveland Clinic, will provide an overview of the unique medical issues of our latest veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan.

Edgardo Padin-Rivera, Ph.D., Chief of Psychological Services at the Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center and co-chair of the Ohio VA Network Mental Health Leadership Council, will cover major trends in mental health seen among veterans including suicide and suicidal behaviors.

Ronald C. Moomaw, D.O. ('80), will discuss principles of diagnosis and treatment of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and how it impacts lives. Moomaw is currently a flight surgeon and psychiatrist with NASA at the Johnson Space Center, where he works with astronauts by psychologically preparing them before all phases of a mission including return to Earth.

Terry A. Johnson, D.O. ('91), and Christopher J. Loyke, D.O. ('88), will share their first-hand, vivid accounts from their experiences on the frontline during their active military duty. Dr. Johnson, a colonel in the Ohio Army National Guard, currently serves as state surgeon, and is a former commander of the National Guard Medical Detachment. He is a veteran of the Global War on Terror and completed three tours of duty. He is rated as a senior flight surgeon. Dr. Loyke, who was deployed to Afghanistan with the US Army Medical Corp in support of Operation Enduring Freedom 2012-13, recently returned from active duty to his practice in Sagamore Hills, Ohio.

Todd R. Fredricks, D.O., Assistant Professor, Family Medicine, will discuss traumatic brain injury cognitive assessments, rehabilitation and considerations for primary care. His presentation will help introduce primary care physicians to military culture, current ideas about tramatic brain injury (TBI) screening and treatment options.

J.D. Polk, D.O., who is the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Health Affairs and Deputy Chief Medical Office of the Department of Homeland Security, will present the Symposium key note address. Dr. Polk will cover the inflection points in healthcare that are on the horizon, and what the social and cultural changes hold for osteopathic medicine. Dr. Polk will ask us to think holistically, not just in medicine, but in leadership in our communities and our country.

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A FOCUS ON ADDICTION MEDICINE

"Ohio has experienced a 1,000-percent increase in opiate painkiller doses prescribed in the past 12 years," Orman Hall, M.A., director of the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services, said. "We've seen some signs of success in the work that's been done over the past couple of years, but to reduce opiate addiction and overdose deaths we have to change prescribing patterns and expand medication-assisted therapy for the recovery of Ohioans." According to the Ohio Board of Pharmacy, last year 67 opiate pills were dispensed for every man, woman, and child in Ohio. In Scioto County, there were 9.7 million doses prescribed to the 78,000 residents of that small county. That is 123 doses for every single person in that county.

Mr. Hall, who was appointed to his position by Gov. John Kasich in January 2011, has more than 20 years of experience in the management, planning, monitoring, and evaluation of public mental health and substance abuse services. He has put together the three-hour block of Addiction Medicine Program sessions on Sunday with a group of experts in the field.

Brad Lander, Ph.D., clinical director of The Ohio State University Department of Addiction Medicine, will lead a session on the specific behaviors of addicts and alcoholics, what he calls "Squirrel Logic." The use of mood altering drugs over time causes fundamental changes to the area of the brain that leads to compulsive and self-destructive behavior.

John C. Whittington, D.O. ('87), former assistant executive director of the Ohio State Board of Pharmacy, and Orman Hall will present Opiates for the Treatment of Chronic Pain, Ohio Focus.

Mark A. Hurst, M.D. and Bradley M. DeCamp, MPA, will team up to provide detailed information about medications used for the treatment of opiate addiction to conclude the three hour program on addiction medicine. Dr. Hurst, Medical Director of the Ohio Department of Mental Health, provides clinical supervision and leadership to the medical and psychiatric staff at Ohio's six regional psychiatric hospitals. He also advises the ODMH director on matters related to recruitment, research, community mental health plans, and licensure of private hospitals and residential facilities. Mr. DeCamp serves as the Assistant Chief, Treatment and Recovery Services for the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services.
