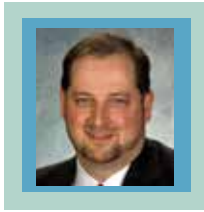

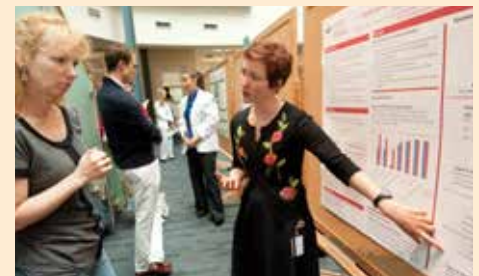
This unique workshop was designed to encourage interaction, group discussion and problem-solving.
